International Coffee Day

The General Assembly,

Reaffirming its resolution [70/1](#) of 25 September 2015, entitled “Transforming our world: the 2030 Agenda for Sustainable Development”, in which it adopted a comprehensive, far-reaching and people-centred set of universal and transformative Sustainable Development Goals and targets, and its commitment to working tirelessly for the full implementation of the Agenda by 2030,

Reaffirming also its resolutions [53/199](#) of 15 December 1998 and [61/185](#) of 20 December 2006 on the proclamation of international years, and Economic and Social Council resolution [1980/67](#) of 25 July 1980 on international years and anniversaries, in particular paragraphs 1 to 10 of the annex thereto on the agreed criteria for the proclamation of international years, as well as paragraphs 13 and 14, in which it is stated that an international year should not be proclaimed before the basic arrangements for its organization and financing have been made,

Recalling its resolution [79/131](#) of 4 December 2024, by which it invited the International Coffee Organization to participate in the sessions and the work of the General Assembly in the capacity of observer,

Welcoming resolution 6/2025 of 4 July 2025, entitled “International Coffee Day”, adopted by the Conference of the Food and Agriculture Organization of the United Nations at its forty-fourth session,¹

Recognizing the cultural, social and historical significance of coffee, from its origins to its significant role in the development of contemporary societies, in which it has become not only an important agricultural commodity and source of livelihood for communities, but also a symbol of social interaction, cultural expression and everyday tradition across generations,

Noting that coffee represents the main livelihood source for millions of households and represents an important source of revenue for many developing countries,

Noting also that coffee production and processing contribute to the fight against hunger (Sustainable Development Goal 2), the reduction of extreme poverty (Goal 1), the empowerment of women (Goal 5), and the provision of decent work and economic growth (Goal 8),

Recognizing that coffee provides economic benefits at each step of the global value chain and greatly contributes to the economies of both exporting and importing countries,

Emphasizing the importance of coffee consumption and fair distribution of revenue along the value chain, aimed at supporting the livelihoods of the various participants, especially smallholder farmers,

Recalling the urgent need to raise public awareness of the importance of coffee for sustainable livelihoods and to improve the coffee value chain to contribute to the 2030 Agenda for Sustainable Development,

Trusting that the celebration of International Coffee Day would foster collective actions to implement activities in favour of the sustainable production and consumption of coffee and raise awareness of its importance in fighting hunger, malnutrition and poverty,

1. *Decides* to designate 1 October as International Coffee Day;
2. *Invites* all Member States, organizations of the United Nations system, members of the specialized agencies and observers of the General Assembly, other international, regional and subregional organizations and other relevant stakeholders, including civil society, Indigenous Peoples, local communities, the private sector and academia, to observe International Coffee Day, as appropriate, through activities aimed at raising awareness of the importance of coffee and its economic, social and environmental impacts, including for food security and nutrition, and its interactions with ecosystem functions, and sharing best practices in this regard;
3. *Invites* the Food and Agriculture Organization of the United Nations, in collaboration with all relevant organizations, in particular the International Coffee Organization, to facilitate the observance of International Coffee Day, mindful of the provisions contained in the annex to Economic and Social Council resolution [1980/67](#);
4. *Stresses* that the costs of all the activities that may arise from the implementation of the present resolution should be met through voluntary contributions, including from the private sector;

5. *Invites* all relevant stakeholders to contribute to and support International Coffee Day;

6. *Requests* the Secretary-General to bring the present resolution to the attention of all Member States, members of the specialized agencies and observers of the General Assembly, the organizations of the United Nations system and other international, regional and subregional organizations and other relevant stakeholders, including civil society, Indigenous Peoples, local communities, the private sector and academia, for appropriate observance.
